

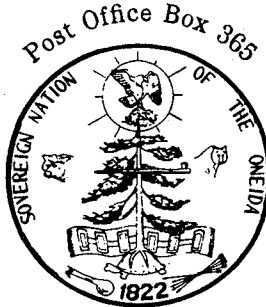


Onondas bringing several hundred bags of corn to Washington's starving army at Valley Forge, after the colonists had consistently refused to aid them.

RESOLUTION NO. 3-11-83-K

WHEREAS, The Indian Self-Determination Act granted Tribes the right to contract for Bureau Programs; and,

WHEREAS, The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a Tribe recognized by the United States; and,

WHEREAS, The Bureau of Indian Affairs is responsible to assist Tribe in their endeavors,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Oneida Business Committee request a contract from the Bureau of Indian Affairs to provide funding from unbanded allocations for curriculum development within the Oneida Bilingual/Bicultural Program,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That contract negotiations, amendments and/or modifications be initiated through the Language Director and the Tribal Administrator who will seek final approval of the Oneida Business Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That all allocations pertaining to this contract be made available April 1, 1983 via letter of Credit and that the proposed term of the contract commence on October 1, 1984 and complete September 31, 1985.
