
Environmental Protection Agency Grant

- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe has assumed responsibility for preserving and protecting the waters of the Oneida Reservation for future generations, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe has established the Oneida Environmental Department to "effectively promote a respect for our environment using our abilities to plan, educate and regulate with the cooperation of the Oneida community", and
- WHEREAS, the function of the Oneida Water Resources Program is to maintain and improve our surface water quality, and
- WHEREAS, 401 Certification, Data storage and Ambient Monitoring Design-- build upon existing tribal ordinances and standards toward the implementation of Oneida Water Resource Ordinances and Oneida Water Quality Standards.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin submits a grant application to the Environmental Protection Agency for a grant under Section 106 of the Clean Water Act.
